



Artist Communities Alliance (ACA) to Receive \$40,000 Grant from the National Endowment for the Arts

Artist Communities Alliance (ACA) has been approved for a \$40,000 Grants for Arts Projects award from the National Endowment for the Arts (NEA) to support the development and implementation of workshops and tools to help artist residency programs assess and build their equitable capacity. This project includes a series of targeted workshops to tackle critical gaps in equitable practice, and the field-wide adoption of a residency self-assessment tool, ACA's [Five Pillars of a Healthy Residency](#).

"The National Endowment for the Arts is proud to support arts projects like this one from Artist Communities Alliance that help support the community's creative economy," said NEA Acting Chair Ann Eilers. "Artist Communities Alliance is among the arts organizations nationwide that are using the arts as a source of strength, a path to well-being, and providing access and opportunity for people to connect and find joy through the arts."

Grounded in goals and values outlined in [ACA's 2021-2023 Strategic Plan](#), trainings will engage programs across five key areas of organizational health: Identity, Program Design, Stewardship, Resource Development Development and Operational Excellence. This initiative will provide tactical strategies for program evaluation, equitable jury and selection models, staffing protocols and other key areas of residency operations. Workshops, running in tandem with continuous meta-network and field conversations, will foster a culture of inquiry, reflection, transparency and change.

"I developed this initiative to contribute to the stability of residencies and to help them build their equitable capacity, meaning the ability of an individual or organization to be equitable in their work and begin to dismantle white body supremacy," stated ACA Executive Director, Lisa Funderburke Hoffman. "We piloted these programs in 2021 and embarked on a journey of learning and growth with an amazing cohort of staff members from artist residency programs. We have already seen significant impact and change within the field and look forward to continuing to cultivate these learning opportunities."

ACA's project is among 1,248 projects across the United States - totaling \$28,840,000 in funding - that were selected to receive this first round of fiscal year 2022 funding. **ACA congratulates the following member programs approved for Grants for Arts Projects awards in the Artist Communities category:**
